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Aim of the Excursion

- Flying squirrel (*Pteromys volans*) lives only in Finland and in Estonia in the European Union
- Excursion was targeted to project personnel. It is a good way to
 - Exchange knowledge between 14 Finnish and 4 Estonian project partners
 - See habitats of flying squirrels in North-East Estonia (Ida-Virumaa)
 - See examples of project activities

Forest day 1: Heinassaare old growth forest and Selisoo, Alutaguse NP

Forest day 2: Mäetaguse oak forest, Permisküla, Vasknarva, Riisisna, Alajõe, Uusküla, Alutaguse Visitor Centre in Kauksi

In Estonia, flying squirrel is critically endangered

- Main reason for this unfavourable situation is loss and fragmentarion of suitable habitats
- Flying squirrel is listed in the EU's Habitats Directive II and IV(a)
 - $\circ\,$ Each breeding site and resting place is strictly protected: they must not be deteriorated or destructed
 - $_{\circ}\,$ All known flying squirrel locations are inventoried annually
 - During the Flying Squirrel LIFE project, also potential forests have been inventoried and new occupied forests are found



Forest day 1: Heinassaare old growth forest and Selisoo

- Heinassaare as one of the most valuable old-growth forests in Estonia
- Under nature protection since 1959
- Very high biodiversity, also flying squirrels are present
- Selisoo: former commercial forest, which, thanks to its protection, has become a very good habitat for flying squirrels

Forest day 2: FS habitats by Narva river and lake Peipus

- **Permisküla island**: FS habitat on the border between Estonia and Russia. How were the flying squirrels able to cross the 80 meter wide river and from which side did they come to the island?
- **Riisisna**: A FS habitat located on the edge of Alutaguse NP, which we discovered during the first year of the project's fieldwork. In strong isolation, bordered by swamps on one side and commercial forests on the other.
- **Remniku village test site** (on the photo): challenges in creating habitat connection corridors under high voltage power lines. RMK cooperation with the power line company.
- **Uusküla**: The most recently found habitat of the FS. The second site besides lisaku, which is located in a village, close to human settlement.



Alutaguse Visitor Centre

- RMK has renewed the exhibition that gives an overview of the nature and human history of Alutaguse National Park
- The exhibition and the film summoned up excellently the field sites we had visited during the excursion



Some of the topics discussed over the two days:

- Is the continuity of aspen trees (and flying squirrel habitats) ensured in protected areas?
- How to increase the motivation of forest owners in keeping rare species? Would higher compensations be the solution? How should the state communicate the imposition of strict restrictions?
- The principles of taking the flying squirrel's habitats under protection and setting the protection regime.
- Management options in protected areas.
- · Monitoring and inventories of FS habitats.













Feedback from the excursion

According to the feedback, the exursion was 100 % satisfying and useful (8 answers).

It is essential to be able to discuss with people from different backgrounds to open up thinking and increase understanding. After getting to know each other, it is easier to cooperate and engage in discussions about even more difficult issues related to nature protection.

Experiencing the field sites by oneself, guided by a local experts, significantly increases knowledge and understanding.
